



What's special about the US university system is that students learn from these great minds during class and then gain exclusive access during office hours.

Moreover, with fame comes funding. Because of how renowned these professors are, they often secure substantial amounts of funding for their research. This allows them to continue creating and expanding knowledge in their fields—such as technology, medicine, economic sciences, computer sciences, history, arts, and criminal justice—at an unparalleled level across the world.

Of course, increased funding means greater participation. Research departments with top-level funding are eager to involve bright students in their projects, offering them the opportunity to work one-on-one with renowned professors and experts in the field. This provides students with professional experience, recognition in academic and scientific communities, and publication opportunities. If the student's research is compelling, top US universities offer grants and scholarships to support the continuation of their work.

Meet Talia—a Crimson student who was accepted to the University of Pennsylvania for Physics and Biophysics. She is funded through the Vagelos Scholars Program in Molecular Life Sciences. Students admitted to this highly exclusive programme receive a stipend and begin conducting research during the summers after their second and third years. This opportunity allows them to gain a solid foundation in scientific research while engaging in cutting-edge projects. The stipend continues into the students' third and fourth years, enabling them to focus on their research interests.

Reason 4: Flexible Curriculum

One distinctive trait of universities in the United States is the teaching model, which emphasises students' academic, personal, and professional growth—both inside and outside the classroom.

Classes are more dynamic, focusing on debates, discussions, and interactive learning experiences rather than just reading from a textbook. The teaching model places greater emphasis on the student's academic autonomy, helping them become more self-sufficient. This flexibility also allows students to delay declaring their majors for a few semesters—a feature that is less common at universities around the world.

Core Courses

For the first two years of university, students are required to take classes that serve as the foundation for any career. These are known as “core undergraduate courses,” and students can choose from courses that fall under the following categories:

▶ Natural Sciences

Biology, Physics, Astronomy, Geology, etc.

▶ Mathematics

Geometry, Calculus, Statistics, Algebra, etc.

▶ Foreign Languages

Arabic, French, Spanish, Chinese, Vietnamese, etc.

▶ English

Creative Writing, Journalism, English Literature, Poetry, etc.

▶ Humanities

History, Linguistics, Philosophy, Religious Studies, etc.

▶ Social Sciences

Psychology, Geography, Anthropology, Sociology, etc.

▶ Visual and Performing Arts

Theatre, Music, Studio Art, Film, etc.

Major Specific Courses

While students complete their core courses, they also need to fulfil their major requirements. For example, a Mechanical Engineering major will need to complete courses in Thermodynamics, Computer Science, Design, and Construction. Generally, majors that lead directly to a professional career, such as Nursing, Accounting, or Architecture, will have more specific requirements. Within these major-specific courses, students can specialise further within their field. For instance, some Nursing students may choose courses in Public Health, while others may focus on Emergency Medicine.

Majors that do not directly lead to a professional career, such as Math, Psychology, and History, typically have fewer major-specific requirements, allowing students to take more elective courses.

Electives

Outside of taking core and major-specific courses, students are free to explore their other interests through electives. Electives can range from additional classes within the core curriculum to unconventional ones that you may never have thought existed. On the surface, these courses may seem unusual, but **it's important to remember that the pursuit of intellectual curiosity and creativity can often appear unconventional at first.** For instance, Steve Jobs, the founder of Apple, famously audited a course on Calligraphy, which later played a crucial role in the design and success of Apple products.

This is known as a "double major" or a "dual degree" and allows students to specialise further within a particular field (typically arts or sciences) or to gain knowledge from different disciplines.

Attendees of top universities are often among the world’s most accomplished students. This diverse environment fosters a high-level academic atmosphere where students benefit not only from the expertise of their teachers but also from the intellectual curiosity and diversity of their peers. Additionally, most US universities require students to live on campus for at least one year, believing that a residential community enhances student learning, socialisation, and independence.

By recruiting top candidates nationally and internationally, US universities create an environment where the best students from around the world interact with each other. Learning alongside like-minded yet diverse peers allows your child to be continually challenged by the rigours of a top-tier educational environment.

The Holistic Application Process

Top US universities look for well-rounded students. This means that admissions officers want to see a combination of intellectual vitality, leadership, initiative, creativity, and personal qualities. This is demonstrated through:



As a general standard, international students from non-English-speaking countries must demonstrate English proficiency through a test such as the TOEFL, IELTS, or Duolingo English Test. Each university will determine the specific score required for admission, with top universities typically requiring a fluent level.

Academics

Academics are the first “cutting factor” when admissions officers look at an application. During the review process, they will look through an applicant’s transcripts from Grade 9 through Grade 12, and look for the following:

Capacity

Does the applicant demonstrate academic tenacity in their course selections, and are they prepared to take on the demands of university-level courses?

Initiative

Do the applicant’s elective courses demonstrate interest and commitment to a particular area of study?

Advancement

Do the applicant’s grades demonstrate improvement over time? How does the applicant show that they are, or have become, a strong student?

Transcript Quality

When evaluating transcripts, Admissions Officers assess the following:

- **Course progression**
- **Number of advanced courses taken if available (e.g., AP, IB, A-levels)**
- **Subject criteria: Within Maths, English, Social Sciences, and Languages, did your child achieve the best grades possible?**
- **Breadth of skill within the “Academic Solids”: Maths, Sciences, Humanities, and Languages. This is what Admissions Officers examine most closely.**
- **Learning a language outside of school**



Curricular Rigour

- **Relative to school offerings, did your child choose the most challenging options?**
- **Did your child self-study or take any subjects outside of school offerings?**
- **Did your child participate in any research opportunities?**

This is where Admissions Officers will evaluate their academic capacity. It will make a significant difference if they are involved in advanced curricula such as the International Baccalaureate (IB), Advanced Placement (AP), or A-Levels.

▶ International Baccalaureate (IB)

It is a two-year diploma programme for students aged 16 to 19, offered in over 5,000 schools across more than 150 countries. The IB Diploma is designed to be a challenging and rigorous programme that prepares students for success in university.

▶ Advanced Placement (AP)

It is a programme of college-level courses offered in high schools. AP courses are available in a variety of subjects, including English, mathematics, science, and history. Students who take AP courses and achieve high scores on the AP exams can receive college credit for those courses.

▶ A-Levels

They are a two-year programme of college-level courses offered in a variety of subjects, including English, Mathematics, Science, and History. Students who take A-Levels and earn high grades demonstrate their ability to handle university-level rigor.

High School Grades

Admissions Officers will look at the following:

- **Individual grades and predicted grades**
- **Weighted and unweighted Grade Point Average (GPA)**
- **Class rank: To be considered competitive at a top US university, your child should aim for the top 1-10% of their class.**

Did you know?

Applicants are compared against other candidates from the same school who also applied to the same programme within the same year.

Intellectual Vitality

To assess an applicant's intellectual vitality, Admissions Officers will consider the following questions:

- **How is the student academically involved both in and out of school?**
- **How does the student demonstrate ambition?**
- **Does the student demonstrate exploration within their field of interest?**

At Ivy League universities, the average admit has a perfect (or near perfect) GPA:

- **Harvard University: 4.18**
- **Yale University: 4.19**
- **Princeton University: 3.9**


Standardised Tests - SAT and ACT

The SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) and the ACT (American College Test) assess a student's readiness for university and serve as a common data point that admissions officers use to compare applicants. These tests:

- **Assess whether a student is ready for an academic workload at the university level in English.**
- **Allow for the comparison of students from different educational systems.**
- **Demonstrate that the student has mastered certain content, enabling them to directly enter more advanced subjects at university.**
- **Are used as selection criteria for specific scholarships.**

Differences Between School Academics and the SAT/ACT

► School Academics

There is room to exhibit academic prowess, which is based on the number of subjects your child takes and the rigor of those subjects.

✓ Pro

There is an opportunity for your child to demonstrate academic prowess, depending on the number of subjects they take and the rigour of those subjects.

✗ Con

It's difficult to recover from poor academic performance. Generally, if your child's academic record does not meet the university's expectations, the admissions officers may not evaluate other criteria.



▶ SAT/ACTs

These tests are among the most objective assessments, and it is possible for your child to achieve a perfect score.

✓ Pro

The results are straightforward and difficult to misinterpret. If your child consistently performs well on these tests, it can significantly enhance their profile and set them apart from the competition.

✗ Con

Poor performance on these tests can have a substantial negative impact on your application. It's crucial to determine whether the test scores are required for the application.

Major Upcoming Changes to the ACT Exam

In July 2024, the ACT announced significant updates to the ACT exam aimed at providing students with more choice and flexibility.

- **Optional Science Section:**

Starting in spring 2025 for national online tests and in spring 2026 for school-day testing, the ACT will make the science section optional. The core test will include English, Reading, and Math, which will together form the college-reportable composite score ranging from 1 to 36. Students can choose to take the ACT with or without the science section, similar to the already optional writing section. This allows students to focus on their strengths and showcase their abilities in the best possible way.

- **Shorter Test Duration:**

The ACT test will be shortened from three hours to two hours. To achieve this, the reading and English sections will feature shorter passages and fewer questions—44 fewer questions in total. This change aims to make the testing experience more manageable, allowing students to perform their best without the fatigue that often accompanies longer exams.


- **Cost and Accessibility:**

According to CNN, the cost of taking the ACT will decrease, making it more accessible to a broader range of students. Additionally, students will have the option to take the exam digitally or with paper and pencil (available only in the US).

Implementation Timeline

- **Spring 2025:** Online testing begins in the U.S. with the new format. Since only the online format is available outside the U.S., it is expected that the new format will start at the same time internationally.
- **Spring 2026:** School-day testing will adopt the new format.

These changes are part of a strategy to make both the SAT and ACT more accessible and attractive to future applicants. We will later explore how COVID-19 impacted standardised tests and the admissions landscape, leading universities to reinstate requirements for test scores.



Before and After Covid-19 - The Test Optional Policy

The COVID-19 pandemic significantly disrupted students' ability to take standardised tests like the SAT and ACT due to widespread school closures and restrictions on public gatherings. In response to these challenges, many universities temporarily adopted test-optional, test-blind, or test-flexible policies to maintain equitable access to higher education. Under test-optional policies, students were not penalised for not submitting test scores, though strong scores could enhance their applications. Test-blind universities did not consider any test scores, even if submitted, while test-flexible institutions required scores only under specific conditions, such as AP exam results or certain GPA thresholds.


However, the shift to test-optional policies led to a surge in applications to competitive universities, coupled with historically low admission rates, as the pool of candidates increased significantly. In response, many top US universities have reinstated standardised test requirements starting from the 2024-2025 application cycle, citing correlations between higher test scores and first-year college success. Institutions like Harvard, Stanford, and Yale, among others, have noted that SAT and ACT scores help differentiate applicants, particularly when school grades are similar. Research suggests that high test scores can indicate strong academic potential, which is valuable in evaluating candidates from diverse backgrounds.

Why Extracurriculars Are Important

Top US universities aim to nurture the innovators of the 21st century. Admissions officers look for a well-rounded profile that showcases intellectual curiosity, leadership skills, and a commitment to making a positive impact on the community. They are particularly interested in seeing that your child has gone beyond mere participation in an organisation or project, demonstrating a higher level of responsibility and initiative.

By actively engaging in extracurricular activities and taking on significant roles, your child can show how they will contribute to the campus community and culture. This involvement communicates to admissions officers that they are not just a passive participant but someone who will be an asset to the university.

Here is what **Stanford** has to say about the importance of extracurriculars:

“Learning about your extracurricular activities and non-academic interests helps us understand your potential contributions to the Stanford community. Students often assume our primary concern is the number of activities in which a student participates. In fact, an exceptional depth of experience in one or two activities may demonstrate your passion more than minimal participation in five or six clubs.

In general, we want to understand the impact you have had at your job, in your family, in a club, in your school or in the larger community, and we want to learn of the impact that experience has had on you.”

The vast majority of candidates who apply to these universities are excellent students with similar academic profiles. While that is enough to get an applicant through the first round, it is their extracurricular activities that will distinguish your child from other applicants, ultimately determining whether or not they get accepted.



Academics will unlock your child's "door."

For example, approximately 85% of Harvard applicants have a very similar academic level!

Your extracurricular activities will distinguish your child from other candidates.



Key Factors Evaluated by Admissions Officers

▶ Commitment

This factor indicates the level of dedication and time commitment your child has allocated to their extracurricular activities. Admissions Officers also consider the duration of your child's involvement with the activity, which reflects their sustained commitment and passion over time.

▶ Leadership

Here, evaluators assess whether your child has held leadership positions within their extracurricular activities. Holding leadership roles demonstrates an applicant's ability to take initiative, collaborate with others, and their potential to make a positive impact. In general, leadership might be:

1. Institutional

- Student Body President
- Organization Ambassador
- Club Leader
- Team Captain

2. Innovative

- Startup Founder
- Competition Creator
- App or Program Developer
- Campaign Leader

3. Independent

- Launching a Successful Blog
- Conducting Research
- Producing a Successful Fundraiser
- Competitions & Internships/Work

▶ Consistency with the Applicant's Profile

This criterion examines how well your child's extracurriculars align with their overall profile and if this establishes a cohesive personal narrative. Do the applicant's chosen activities reflect their genuine interests and aspirations?

▶ Impact and Reach

Top universities also want to see evidence of impact within an applicant's school, local community, and on a national or international scale. This has become especially important since the pandemic. Here are some examples:

1. School

- Raising \$5,000 for new library computers
- Leading a tutoring club with 30 tutors supporting 100 peers
- Lobbying for Meatless Mondays at the school cafeteria, and succeeding!

2. Local

- Increasing involvement amongst your peers as a City Youth Council member
- Starting a travelling library that reaches underserved communities
- Organising a 5K race to fundraise for a local charity or small business

3. (Inter)National

- Launching an educational YouTube channel that reaches a nationwide or global audience

Under this category, the focus is on any awards, honours, or notable achievements your child has received through their extracurricular pursuits. It also demonstrates their ability to improve over time, showcasing their dedication to excelling in their chosen activity.

- Activities that show their **leadership** (eg: starting a club, school leadership positions, launching a business)
- Activities that show their **determination to improve the lives of others** (eg: philanthropy)
- At least 1-2 **non-school affiliated activities** (eg: reputable summer camps or internships)
- Activities that have a **relationship to their indicated chosen major**







The Personal Essay

The Personal Essay (also known as the Personal Statement) is a 650-word essay submitted to every school your child applies to. This essay is a crucial tool for bringing your child's application to life, showcasing their individuality, personal qualities, goals, and motivations.

Examples of personal qualities:

- Self-awareness and reflection
- Social awareness
- Willingness to grow
- Problem solving skills
- Critical thinking
- Service-oriented mindset
- Their compassionate nature
- Resourcefulness

The Personal Essay plays a crucial role in differentiating applicants. With the notoriously low admissions rates at top US universities, a well-written essay can be the key factor between acceptance and rejection.

This is what **Yale** has to say about personal essays:

“When you write your essays and short answer responses, write about something that matters to you. Use your own voice. Your perspective – the lens through which you view your topic – is far more important than the specific topic itself.”

Personal Essay Prompts

While the Common App Personal Essay does not have a specific structure besides the 650-word limit, here are some sample Common Application prompts your child can consider:

1. Some students have a background, identity, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like the student, then they should share their story.
.....
2. The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when the student faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect them, and what did they learn from the experience?
.....
3. Reflect on a time when the student questioned or challenged a belief or idea. What prompted their thinking? What was the outcome?
.....
4. Describe a topic, idea, or concept that the student finds so engaging it makes them lose track of time. Why does it captivate them? What or who do they turn to when they want to learn more?
.....
5. Share an essay on any topic of the student's choice. It can be one they've already written, one that responds to a different prompt, or one of their own design.

Supplemental Essays

Each university your child applies to will ask short-answer questions specific to that school, known as Supplemental Essays. These shorter essays are designed to demonstrate a student's unique fit for the particular school or program they're applying to. When writing these supplemental essays, ensure that your child has researched the school and program thoroughly, showcases a genuine interest in what the university offers, and articulates the role they would play on that campus.

► Ultimately, an outstanding Personal Essay contains:

1. Good writing
2. Personal voice
3. Authenticity
4. Values
5. Insight


Dos and Don'ts

► What to Write ✓

1. Content that is unique
2. Content that demonstrates the candidate's personal traits and characteristics (humour, ingenuity, resourcefulness, resilience, creativity, etc.)
3. Content that shows the applicant's personality (sense of humour, intellectual curiosity, etc.)

► What NOT to Write ✗

1. Content that rehashes what is already listed in other sections of the Common App
2. Unnecessarily ornate or convoluted language
3. Content that brags about the applicant's academic superiority

The Surgeon

The apron drooped to my knees. I was emblazoned with the "Hi, My Name is Jamie" sticker, coupled with a scarlet employee-in-training hat.

The "Fresh not Frozen, Grilled not Fried" motto resonated in my mind. It was July 2011. I had taken the plunge and secured my very first part-time job. I was flipping burgers, and I was excited.

I was accustomed to academia, to the sports field, to the stage, but this was an entirely fresh paradigm. Anuj, the staff trainer and joyously friendly employee tasked with the rather unfortunate challenge of having to teach me hamburgerlogical cuisine, greeted me with a firm handshake. This guy meant business.

The familiar fast-food funk wafted through the tiny store like cologne in an airport duty-free store — overpowering, faintly nauseous, and all-encompassing.

The filing cabinets in my mind usually reserved for physics formulas, economics jargon, and debating cases were tipped out and crammed with permutations and combinations of burgers — Otopo, Chicken Wrappa, Bondi.

Exceptions to French conjugations were momentarily replaced with extra topping combos. The till became my new graphical calculator.

With surgeon-like precision Anuj modeled how to wrap a burger in four swift motions — place burger in the dead center, pull wrap from left to right, then right to left, then roll the corners.

He gestured toward his demonstration model and motioned for me to take to the stage. It was show time! Unfortunately, my burger ended up looking like the aftereffects of Hurricane Katrina. Anuj patted me on the back, said "you'll learn fast" — and smirked.

Suddenly the barricades were overrun and an influx of jandal-wearing, sun-glass-toting beach-goers charged into the store. The orders came flying faster than budget cuts at a Tea Party convention.

I heard the petrifying three words chicken tenderloin combo. This was it, the Everest of my culinary career.

It involved delving into the boss' prized stock of "succulent tenderloins" as he had described, "the highest quality meat we sell, expensive to buy and delicate to cook; we can't afford any mistakes." I was handling meaty gold.

As the first tenderloin slapped on to the grill with a satisfying sizzle, I could imagine the boss's scorching eyes scrutinizing my every action from behind the prying lens of the staff security camera.

Sun-glass-toter number two, the tenderloin culprit, then muttered, "Excuse me! Sorry mate, my fault, I meant the chicken nuggets."

Silently, I screamed. I grimaced, pirouetted, and pleaded with the security camera.

Anuj saw my face, contorted in anguish, and took to the rescue with business-like efficiency. He rolled his eyeballs.

In one graceful movement he scooped the tenderloins and flicked them into the cooler with one hand, and in perfect synchrony, removed the emergency chicken nuggets with the other.

His eyes glistened with intensity. With consummate mastery his arms flicked from grill to cooker to table to bread to wrap. In less than 90 seconds, the order was complete. The boss's eyeballs returned to their sockets. The day was saved.

I worship the Anuj's of this world. Certain jobs may look simple but that simplicity masks years of expertise. My skills in the rococo art of burger flipping paled into insignificance beside the master. I learnt more than burger flipping that day. I learnt humility, respect, and the value of a good chicken tenderloin."

Interviews

In addition to the Personal and Supplemental Essays, interviews are required by most competitive universities in the United States as a way to get to know the applicant better and assess if they are a good fit for the institution. Interviews are typically conducted by current students, alumni, or admissions representatives.



Letters of Recommendation

Letters of recommendation provide the admissions committee with a valuable perspective on the student's academic performance, extracurricular involvement, and personal qualities. Typically written by teachers from the student's high school, they can also come from coaches, counselors, mentors, and administrators. Most universities will request at least two letters of recommendation with the application, though highly competitive programs may require three.

Therefore, it is crucial for students to build strong relationships with these adults throughout high school. By being engaged and committed in their classes and extracurricular activities, students can demonstrate their strengths and potential to those who will be writing their letters of recommendation.

Financial Aid, Scholarships, & Costs

In order to attract and maintain a world-class faculty, top universities need to attract the best students in the world.

Top university endowments are notable. Universities like Harvard (\$40.9 B) and Yale (\$30.1 B) have billionaire endowments, generally derived from alumni donations, their land, artwork, buildings, rare and historic books and documents, and more! These institutions have almost unlimited resources to attract and maintain a world-class faculty, invest in top-of-the-line infrastructure, fund leading-edge research, **and to recruit the best students in the world**

through financial aid and scholarship opportunities. In fact, tens of thousands of students attend top US universities every year **without ever needing to pay back their tuition, expenses, and fees.**



Need-Blind vs. Need-Aware

In the United States, there are a small number of institutions that are **need-blind** for international students. In other words, these universities will evaluate a student's application without considering their financial ability to pay.

Most other universities are **need-aware**, meaning they do take a candidate's financial background into account during the admissions process.

▶ Need-Blind

1. Do NOT review a student's financial situation during the admissions process.
2. There are only 9 need-blind institutions for international students in the USA. 7 of these offer full (100%) financial aid, if you have a demonstrated need.
3. Extremely competitive
4. If your child is a U.S. citizen or Permanent Resident, most U.S. universities are need-blind for them.

▶ Need-Aware


1. Review a student's financial situation during the admissions process.
2. Most universities are need-aware for international applicants. Few are need-aware for US citizens and Permanent Residents.
3. If your child applies for financial aid at a need-aware university, their chances of being admitted may be reduced.
4. How much the applicant's chances are reduced will depend on the strength of their profile and the amount of aid they need.


Athletic Scholarships

US universities are known for investing heavily in college sports — giving out over \$4 billion in athletic scholarships each year. These athletes compete in over 23 sports, including football, basketball, volleyball, tennis, swimming, and track and field.

Athletic scholarships are financial aid awards for students who play sports for their college. Athletic scholarships can cover many costs, including tuition, fees, books, room, and board. The amount of money awarded varies depending on the sport, the school, and the student's athletic ability. To be eligible for an athletic scholarship, students must typically meet certain academic requirements and meet the school's athletic standards. Students must also maintain their eligibility throughout their college career.

US Admissions Preparation Timeline

● 2-3 years before applying

▶ Begin exploration

This is when your child should begin exploring academic interests inside and outside the classroom.

Exploration can include anything from volunteering to competitions.

● 1-2 years before applying

▶ A growing extracurricular profile

Your child should now begin to expand on their extracurriculars, and work on showcasing their leadership skills.

▶ Create university lists

Start researching and touring universities. Help them create a list of schools to apply to.

● 1 year before applying

▶ SAT/ACT- First try

This is a good time for your child to see how they do on the SAT/ACT, and figure out how to perform better next time.

▶ Choose between the TOEFL and IELTS

If your child is applying from a non-native English speaking country, help them choose between these two tests.

● 8 months before applying

▶ SAT/ACT- Second try

If your child needs a higher score, this is a good time for them to take the SAT/ACT for the second time.

● 6 months before applying

▶ Letters of recommendation

Your child should begin asking teachers to write letters of recommendation.

▶ Begin essays

Our experts recommend that applicants start their Common App and Supplemental essays at around this time.

The Current Admissions Landscape

Despite massive global changes after COVID-19, one thing that remains consistent is the increasing number of applications to top US universities. When considering the history of this competition we can look back to the eight Ivy League universities, to which applications have almost doubled in the past decade.


In the 1999–2000 application cycle, the Ivy League received 121,948 applications and reported 24,390 acceptances — a 20% acceptance rate. Most recently, the Ivy League Class of 2027 reported 410,500 applications but only 18,163 acceptances. That’s an overall acceptance rate of just 4.42%

- a 16% drop in acceptance rate.

Applying in the Early Round

More and more universities are turning to Early Round decisions to take large percentages of their incoming class.

▶ Early Action

An admissions process that allows students to apply early and receive a decision before the regular deadline, but without being required to accept the offer.

▶ Early Decision

An admissions process that allows students to apply early and receive a decision before the regular deadline, but they must accept the offer if they are accepted and withdraw their applications to other institutions.

This strategy is commonly used by top schools to help predict their tuition revenue and improve their ranking. What's even better about this — your child's chances of getting into a top US university can double or even TRIPLE, if they use this option!
